A MATH TEAM WE CAN COUNT ON

Not only was the mathematical holiday of Pi Day (3.14) the perfect day for a math competition, but it was also an opportunity for CT students to compete and return home math champions. Mercedes Mull, Maxwell Malicki, Katelyn Turley, Brennan Lohr, and Ashlyn Fetterman represented Conemaugh Township well at the Heritage Conference Math Competition on March 14th at Marion Center High School, earning first place in the event!

The competition was for students in grades 9 through 12, with five talented math students representing each school in the Heritage conference. Events consisted of a written test and five team rounds, featuring challenges in algebra, statistics, geometry, logic puzzles, math vocabulary, and even some calculus.

The same five students represented Conemaugh Township last year as well, taking home 2nd place in 2023. After a pizza lunch, the schools were named in place-order, starting with 12th and working upwards. Our CT mathletes listened with eager anticipation to 12th through 2nd place be called, not to hear Conemaugh Township be named until the judges called 1st place this year.



Conemaugh Township finished with 181 points, followed by Cambria Heights in second with 169, West Shamokin in third with 163, and Portage in fourth with 150.

Normally with the Heritage Academic Competitions, each school gets to name one MVP. However, the school placing first in a competition gets to name two MVPs. Conemaugh Township's MVPs for the math competition were seniors Mercedes Mull and Maxwell Malicki.

Math Team Coach Jakeb Rising said, "I'm very proud of these students, not only to see their dedication to academics shine in events like this, but to see their growth in ability and confidence in the past year."

SADD CLUB MOCK CRASH: THE BRUTAL REALITY

On April 26, CT's SADD club will host an event that brings a very scary scenario to life: the reality of what can happen when people drink before getting behind the wheel of a car. The club has been working for months now to organize a presentation and mock crash scenario that will be shown to students in grades 10, 11, and 12 a couple weeks before prom night. The club, led by Mrs. Buckham and Mrs. Feathers, has been working with first responders from the local EMS, fire, and police departments, the Somerset County Coroner, Conemaugh Medvac, CT's guidance department and administration, and REACH to make this presentation happen. These groups will work together to enact a mock crash scenario that demonstrates all of their roles in a real life crash caused by drunk driving. SADD club officers and selected members of the senior class will play the parts of those involved in the accident. Additionally, the family of Trooper Iwaniec will be speaking with the students to share their own story of loss due to drinking and driving. All of the students will be given an opt-out option, and the club is working closely with REACH and our guidance department to ensure that our students are supported during this event.

BATTLE OF THE BOTS

The Robo Wars contest will be held at United School District on Friday, April 6. The people participating are Noah Getson, Rylan Hillegass, Donovan Dadura, and Preston Thomas. There are usually 7–8 schools that compete and they use a double elimination bracket. The robots can only weigh 10 lbs, which is 2 lbs more than last year. There are referees dressed in the official referee's black and white stripes uniform. The battle structure is enclosed in plexiglass and the students control the battle for two minutes. Points are gathered by pushing into the walls or strikes to the other contestants' bots. The bracket works so that eventually the last two teams faceoff. The loser bracket needs to win two times to be the champion. The very last battle is all machines placed in the arena and they wage war against each other, and the last bot standing is king!


