
Saint Jude's Valentines Cards

Mrs. Lee Salem has been a valued member of the Conemaugh Township family since 2018, bringing dedication, warmth, and a deep love of literature into the classroom. She currently teaches 7th grade English Language Arts, Honors English 11, and serves as the district's ESL teacher. Born in Beaufort, South Carolina, on a military base, she grew up as a proud "military brat." With her father serving in the U.S. Marines, her childhood was filled with frequent moves and new experiences. Although her parents are originally from Buffalo, New York, she spent her early years living in South Carolina, Hawaii, North Carolina, and eventually Pennsylvania. Growing up with two brothers and one sister, her childhood was rich with family time, including fishing trips, camping adventures, and countless backyard baseball games.

A lifelong passion for English and education led her to pursue higher education at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, where she earned her Bachelor's degree in English Education in 2005. She later completed her Master's degree in Literature at Indiana University of Pennsylvania in 2008 and also earned secondary certification in English as a Second Language Instruction.
