
New Year, New Rolls!

2025: The Year to Give Back

ETHAN MATERA

Ethan Matera, a senior athlete at Township, was diagnosed with T-cell Lymphoblastic Lymphoma last year, and our school has been supporting him in every way we can. The senior football players started these fundraising efforts by unanimously deciding to donate the remaining money raised for their new black-out jerseys, which totaled \$1,176.25. Soon after, a T-shirt fundraiser was released for the community from both the volleyball and football teams, followed by games to fundraise as well. Our football boosters even invited involvement from our competitors, receiving financial support from their teams, fanbase, and even their local VFW in Cambria Heights. \$7,500 was the additional amount raised by the football team, and \$1,262 was raised by the volleyball team. The cheer squad also donated \$145. Finally, the SADD club held its annual volleyball marathon and donated \$8,600 to Ethan. The Conemaugh

Township community as a whole has raised over \$18,600 so far for Ethan Matera and his family. While the financial support for the Ethan and his family has been immense, the camaraderie shown by all of these students in support of one of their own really makes this entire effort so special. Our boys basketball team highlighted this unity when Coach Lesko debuted the new team warm-ups and team motto of "One Heartbeat" and our boys and their coach stepped up to shave their heads in a show of unity with their teammate. Thank you to everyone in the community for donating, volunteering, and supporting this cause. This is truly what it means to be a part of Conemaugh Township.

ROTARY

At the start of the school year, our CT Rotary Interact instantly started giving back to the community by collecting used but like-new sneakers to donate. In September, they also gave back to previous members by sending out college care packages and helping raise money for ovarian cancer at our "teal out" game. In October, they cleaned community roads and started their Operation Christmas Child project (delivering 25 boxes in November). In November, the members showed up to decorate Laurel View with the residents, wrote and delivered over 160 veteran cards, over 170 thank you cards, and teacher appreciation cards. They also held a blood drive. In December, the officers went to the radio station in Westmont to record Christmas wishes, got donuts for the faculty and staff of the high school, and made cookies with Cafe 118.

MUSIC MAKES US STRONGER

The Music Makes Us Stronger program was founded by Mrs. Suzette Gardenhour, a former band director at Conemaugh Township, who has been open about her battle with breast cancer.

Mrs. Gardenhour was diagnosed in 2016, and the unwavering support she received from the music department encouraged her to keep fighting. According to Mrs. Gardenhour, "They are the legacy that makes us stronger. They are why that exists, and how we continue to help the community and students." Her inspiring journey prompted her to establish this wonderful program that continues to give back to the community through the power of music. Prior to the concert, several rehearsals were held for each branch of the music department, which gave current members the ability to meet the 115 alumni from previous years. After each section's performance, a basket raffle coupled with a live auction took place, where audience members were encouraged to bid on a wide variety of goods.

Overall, the concert raised upwards of \$13,000 to help support community members and families dealing with cancer. Because of this sensational occasion, the former band and choir directors were given the opportunity to conduct, once more, alumni had the ability to see their legacy being carried out, and all who participated could contribute to a wonderful cause.


PINNING GOALS IN THE NEW YEAR

Aidan qualified in the 50 free, 100 free, 100 breaststroke, 100 butterfly, and 200 freestyle.



STUDENT COUNCIL



SHINING INTO 2026 WITH MRS. SPENGLER

Mrs. Bethany Spengler has been part of the Conemaugh Township family in more ways than one—first as a student from 2010–2014, and now as the district's 6th–12th grade Art Teacher since 2018. Born in Johnstown, PA, she spent her childhood between the Forest Hills and Davidsville areas, moving between her mom's and dad's homes. She was an only child until 2008, when her sister Karly was born, bringing an age gap of about eleven years and a unique dynamic to her upbringing. A proud CT graduate (Class of 2014), Mrs. Spengler went on to attend Pennsylvania Highlands Community College, Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and Greenville University, ultimately earning her Bachelor of Science in PreK–12 Art Education from IUP and her Master's Degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Greenville. Before returning “home” to teach at Township in June 2018, she held several interesting jobs—including the unexpected role of a government service intern for PennDOT (a fancy title for a road flagger!)—and also worked as a long-term substitute teacher at Windber.

Mrs. Spengler's life beyond the art room is full of joy, adventure, and family. She is married to her high school sweetheart, Luke Spengler, whom she met right here at CT in the art room during a crafts class in 2012. Luke graduated in 2012, and the two have now been together for 14 years. Together they share two wonderful children: Josie Beth (5) and Jasper Dean (16 months). When she's not teaching, she loves traveling the world, going on family adventures, thrift shopping, collecting antiques, and giving back to the community. Her colleagues and students hold a special place in her heart, and she feels incredibly grateful to work alongside such talented educators and remarkably creative young artists.

Most importantly, Mrs. Spengler's story with Conemaugh Township is one of gratitude and transformation. She openly shares that she struggled during middle school before transferring to CT after 8th grade—a decision she believes truly changed her life. Township became a safe haven, full of welcoming teachers, kind classmates, and lifelong memories that helped shape who she is today. Now, as a teacher, she brings that same spirit of warmth and acceptance into her classroom. “I adore this place,” she says. “CT is one of a kind and very special. I have so much love for this school and a passion for what I do because of how incredible this community is.” Her dedication, empathy, creativity, and genuine love for her students make Mrs. Bethany Spengler an irreplaceable part of the CT family.


