


VOLLEYBALL MARATHON


MUSICAL



They will find out which pieces they will be performing at the end of November.




































CT MUSIC

Pick of the Patch Teacher: Mr. Rising

For eight years, Mr. Jakeb Rising has been inspiring Conemaugh Township students through his passion for math, science, and creative problem-solving. Known for his enthusiasm, kindness, and dedication, Mr. Rising brings an innovative spark to every class he teaches. He began his teaching career at Conemaugh Township in 2018, and this school year marks his 8th year of teaching. Over the years, he has taught Algebra, Trigonometry, Physics, Programming, Robotics, and Strategy & Logic — a unique course emphasizing strategic thinking and logical reasoning through board game design. He also leads the Middle School Gifted Program, coaches academic teams for MathCounts, Scholastic Quiz, Heritage Math, M3 Challenge, and Physics Olympics, and serves as an afterschool tutor.

Born and raised in Indiana, PA, Mr. Rising grew up the middle child of three with an older brother, Andy, and younger sister Hannah. His father worked first as a dairy farmer and later as a truck driver, while his mother is a Speech-Language Pathologist. From an early age, he loved learning and challenging himself — participating in scouting, academic competitions, and church youth activities, and earning the rank of Eagle Scout in March 2014. A graduate of Marion Center High School, where he was salutatorian of the Class of 2014, Mr. Rising went on to earn his Bachelor's degree in Secondary Mathematics Education and Applied Mathematics (with a minor in Physics) from the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown in 2018. He later completed a Master's in Physics from Texas A&M Commerce (now East Texas A&M) in 2023 and is currently pursuing Computer Science teacher certification through Carnegie Mellon University's CEOI program, and he is expected to finish in Spring 2026. Before joining Conemaugh Township, Mr. Rising worked at a bookstore, served as a resident assistant, SI leader, and tutor, and spent his summers at Camp Seph Mack as both Ecology Director and Program Director.

Outside of the classroom, Mr. Rising continues his passion for science education through involvement with the American Association of Physics Teachers – Physics Teacher Resource Agents (AAPT-PTRA), where he leads professional development workshops and was recently elected Co-Chair of the AAPT Physics in K-12 Education Community. He also contributes to the Quantum for All initiative, helping bring quantum physics education to students nationwide. At home, Mr. Rising shares his life with four cuddly cats — Chance, Zephyra, Cookie, and Butterscotch — and two energetic dogs, Hank and Bruce. He and his partner Jesse will celebrate two years together this December. When he's not teaching or mentoring, he enjoys traveling, baking, board games, and everything Pokémon-related. He also assists with Euro Club and Scouts, continuing his lifelong love of learning and leadership.
