We continued exploring winter with a Polar Animals theme this week. We started our week by looking at flashcards of different animals that live in either the Arctic or in Antarctica. We learned about polar bears, orca whales, snowy owls, emperor penguins, and walruses. After we learned the names of the polar animals, we played an arctic animal match game by matching together the adult animal with the correct baby animal.

Our sensory table saw the addition of laminated picture cutouts of penguins and polar bears to join the cotton ball and felt snow. When playing with the animals, we practiced counting and also worked on learning how to tell which cutout is bigger and which is smaller.

We played Penguin Bowling in the classroom with penguin "bowling pins" and a small kickball. We also played with the taste-safe snow from last week. Ice painting with ice cubes colored with food dye was explored this week as well. We changed up the classic "Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear" song to "Polar Bear, Polar Bear" and the Seedlings had a fun time showing off their dance moves.

We read books this week that included penguins and polar bears. We read *Penguins Love Their ABC's* by Saray Aspinall and *Peekaboo Polar Bear* by Gary De La Cour. Both books captivated the Seedlings and provided ABC and counting practice.

Hats off to the Saplings for their outstanding musical performance last night!

The Saplings have been playing and sledding in the fresh snow and spent the week talking about *Snowflakes and Snowmen*. We explored some captivating facts about snowflakes. The formation of snowflakes, noting that no two are identical. We scrutinized the patterns and counted the six sides they possess. A snowflake begins to form when an extremely cold water droplet freezes onto a dust particle in the sky, creating an ice crystal. As the ice crystal falls to the ground, water vapor freezes onto the crystal, building the six arms of the snowflake. A snowflake's journey from sky to the ground is about 20 minutes.

Our Saplings' participation in snowy activities promoted development in literacy, math, and creativity. By retelling *There Was a Cold Lady Who Swallowed Some Snow*,



they practiced sequencing, developing memory, comprehension, and story structure understanding. Upon finishing *The Snowy Day* by Ezra Jack Keats, they recreated the storyline by forming diverse footprints in the snow. We also explored "footprints" in the snow, comparing sizes, and examined the various animals living in our woods, stumbling upon Yeti tracks that led to Saplings crafting an Abominable Snowman.

A literacy snowman name building craft that provided a fun and interactive learning experience. It was an effective way for the Saplings to practice spelling their names, their classmates' names, and recognizing the letters and sounds within their names. The Saplings stacked the letters in their names and then added the snowmen's heads on top.

A range of snow-themed math and manipulative activities were undertaken throughout the week. The Snowman roll and cover activity proved to be the most popular. Rolling a die never fails to excite the students. This particular game facilitates the development of various early learning skills, including teamwork, turn-taking, fine motor skills, numerical recognition, basic arithmetic, and comparison.

Just as your children are unique, every snowflake is one-of-a-kind, yet each one is perfect.



This week in math we learned new ways to do bigger division problems including problems with dividends to the thousands place. We also learned how to use rounding and multiplication to check our quotients to see if we got the problems correct. Also in math we reviewed double digit multiplication to make sure that we were still doing it correctly.

This week in reading we did not do a new story or reading strategy due to our musical practices and winter program. We worked really hard on these and it was great! Many people came to both shows and like always the Saplings put on a wonderful preshow.

This week in Science we learned how to tell the difference between a snowflake and a snowfake! Then we created snowflakes to decorate our classroom windows. We also wrapped up our science unit on food webs by creating dinosaur food webs and learned how the sun was blocked from so much asteroid dust and that killed all of the plants. Since the plants died, many of the smaller dinosaurs that ate plants died which caused the carnivore larger dinosaurs to lose their food source and become extinct.
