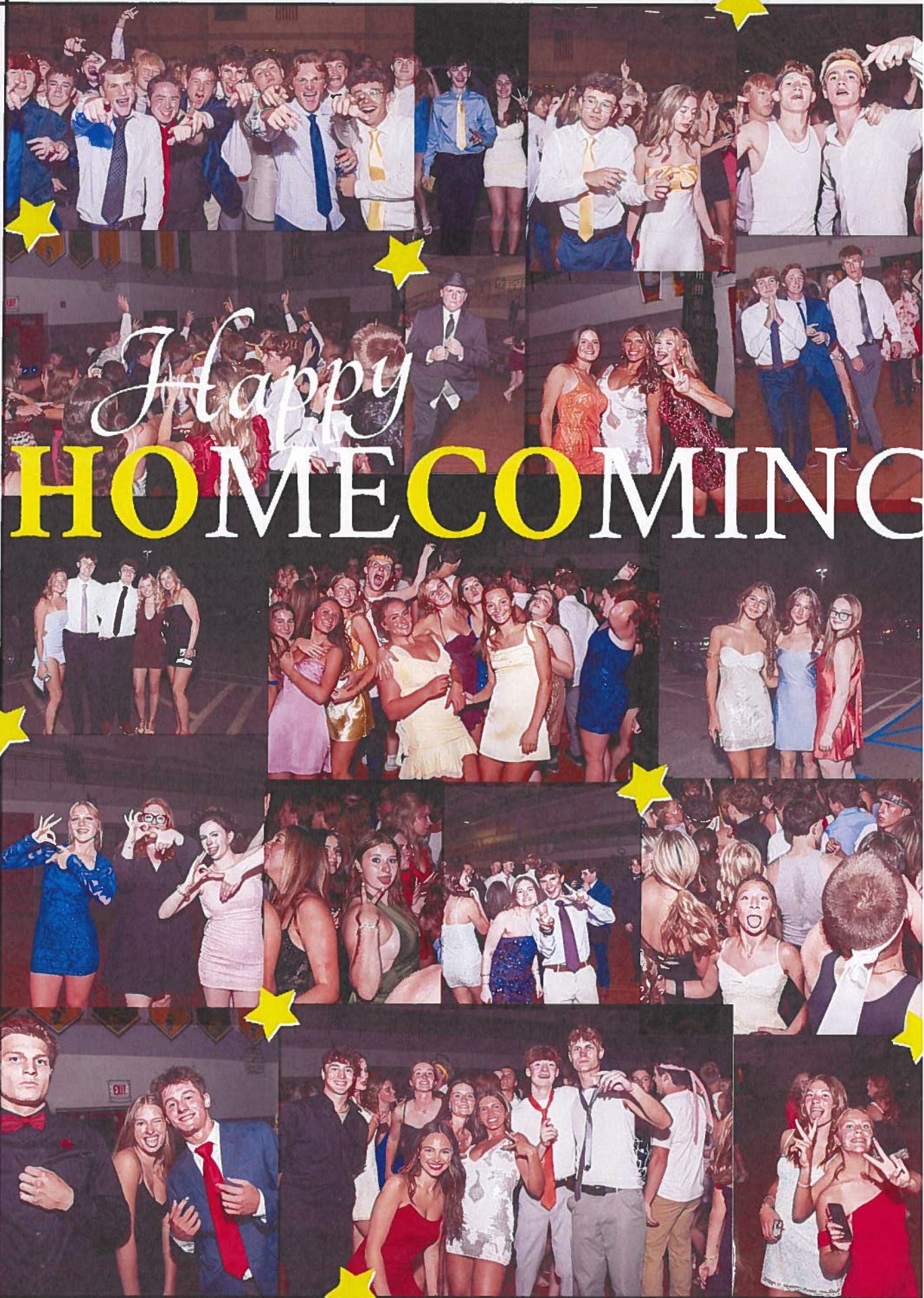

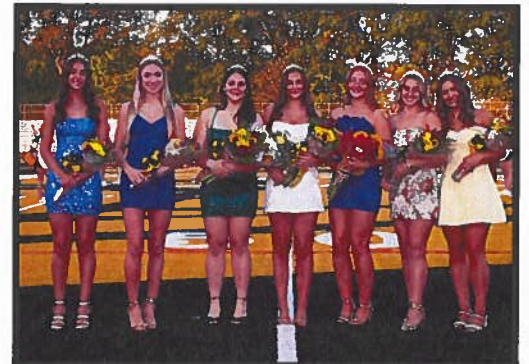


Editorial

OLD SHOE HISTORY

This year was the 79th annual "Old Shoe" game, however the game has a more complex history than meets the eye. In 1948, head coach of Kingston High School Ted Zella, selected a shoe at random after practices. The shoe that was selected is said to be the cleat of the late Dean Johnson's cleat; however no one could be sure.

Another account tells of a former Dallas High School teacher and principal, who stopped to see Dallas coach Robert Dolbear in search of a shoe. They went to his basement and threw all his old shoes in a pile. They picked one out, and had it bronzed. On the day of the old shoe game in 2020, Robert Dolbear passed away ironically.

That is how we got the trophy we use today. In the early years, the Old Shoe Trophy was awarded to the top high school football team in the Back Mountain among Kingston Township, Dallas Township, Lehman Township, and Westmoreland. The winning team was awarded a dinner provided by the Dallas Rotary. The losing coaches were also invited to give speeches. Through the years of consolidation, since the 1960's the tradition evolved into the Dallas/Lake-Lehman Old Shoe Rivalry Game often played as the regular-season finale.

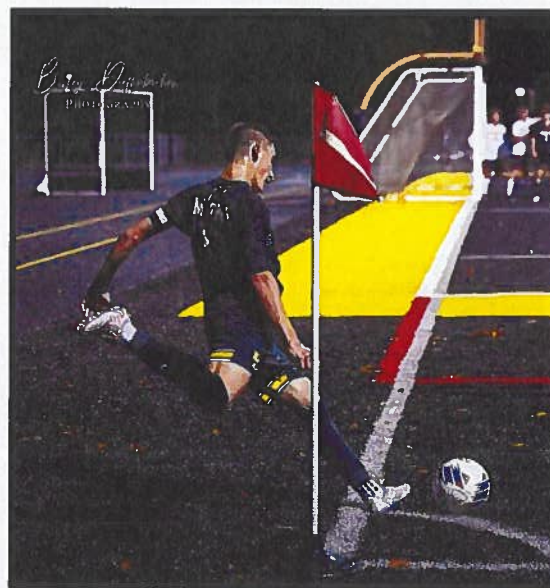
The last time Lake-Lehman won the show was in 2020. Black Knights won 42-0



BOYS SOCCER *District 2 AA* CHAMPIONS

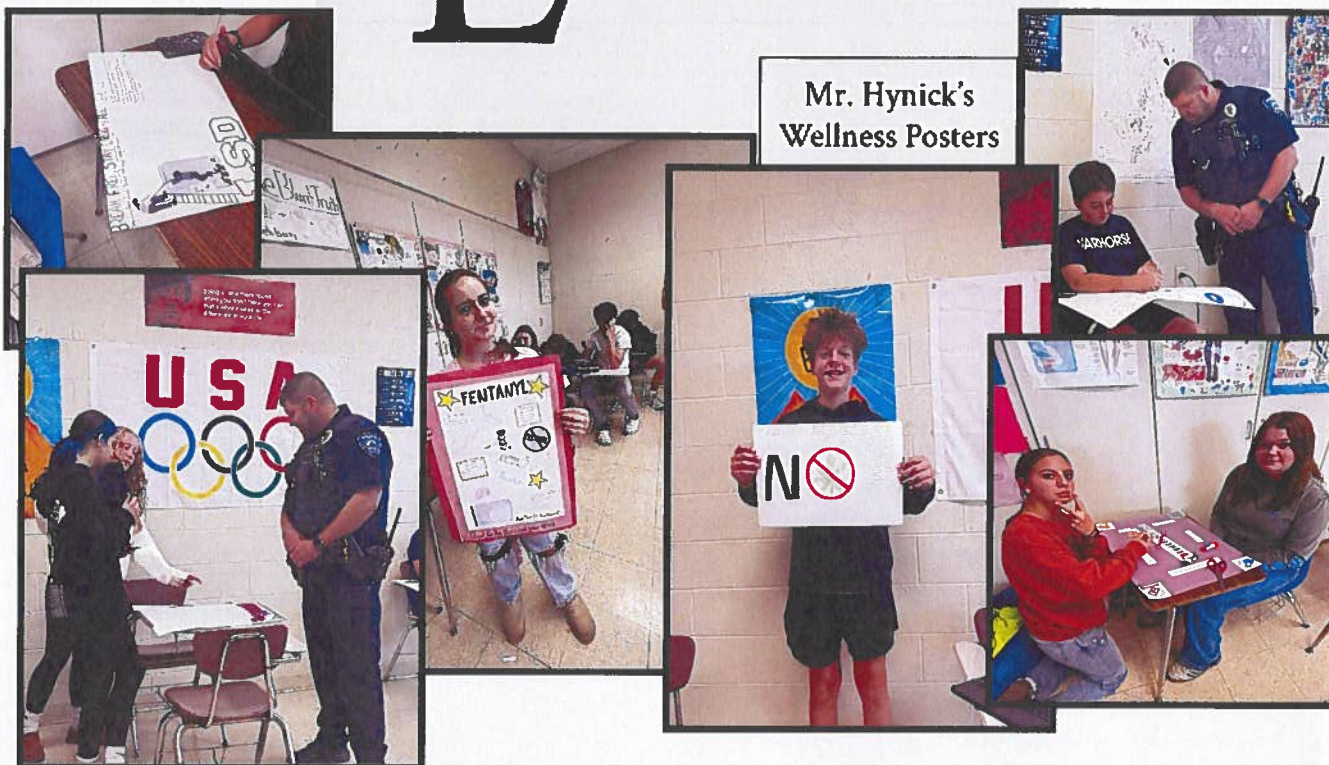

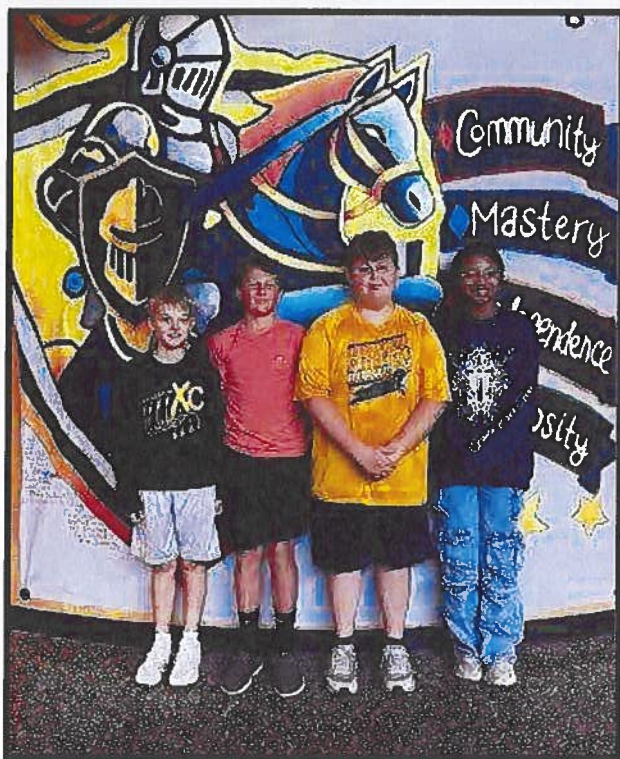

Bon Appetit Cookie Challenge **Tis the Season for Pumpkin**

Mrs Reno-Gromniak's students created a taste of the season, iced pumpkin cookies. Teachers judged the cookies on appearance, aroma, flavor, texture and composition. The judges included Mrs. Knepper, Mr. Novorocki, Mr. Yankoski and Mrs. Honeywell. The final result was cookie #2 made by the team of Hailey Wallace, John Weaver, and Lilia Doughton. Judges stated, "the cookie had a nice balance of dough to icing. It was aromatic and easy to love this cookie." Another faculty judge said, "cookie number 2 was soft, light and evenly baked. Mrs. Honeywell stated in remarks, "This was a difficult decision. Both cookies would be perfect on a Thanksgiving dessert table. Mrs Reno-Gromniak graciously shares the winning recipe below--ENJOY!

Ingredients:

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice,
plus extra for sprinkling
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 1/4 cups canned pumpkin puree
1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream Cheese Frosting

8 ounces (1 brick) low-fat cream
cheese, room temperature
3 tablespoons butter, room
temperature
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 cups powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, pumpkin pie spice, and salt until combined. Set aside.

In the bowl of a stand mixer, cream together the butter, granulated sugar, and brown sugar on medium-high speed for 1 minute until light and fluffy. Add in the pumpkin, egg, and vanilla to butter mixture, and beat on medium-speed until just combined. Fold in the dry ingredients until just combined.

Drop on cookie sheet by heaping tablespoonfuls (I like to use this cookie scoop), then use your fingers or a spoon to flatten them slightly. (These cookies tend to poof up slightly rather than flatten during baking, so shape them beforehand however you'd like. They won't rise much.)

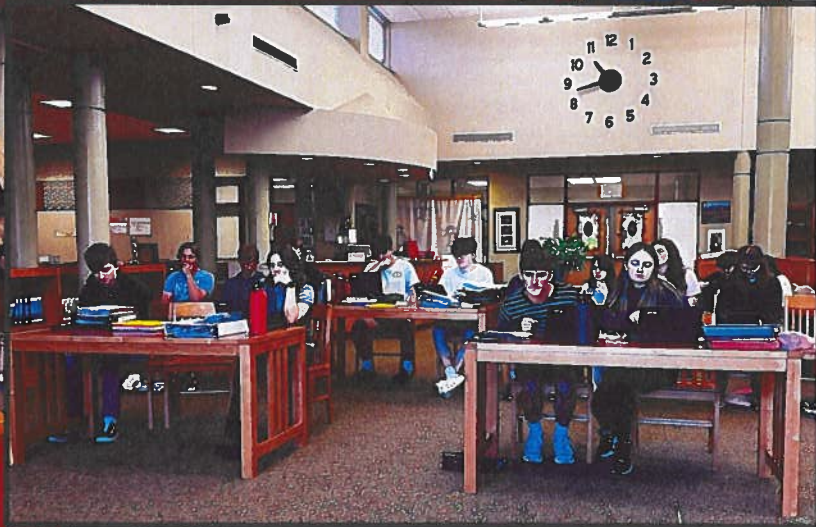
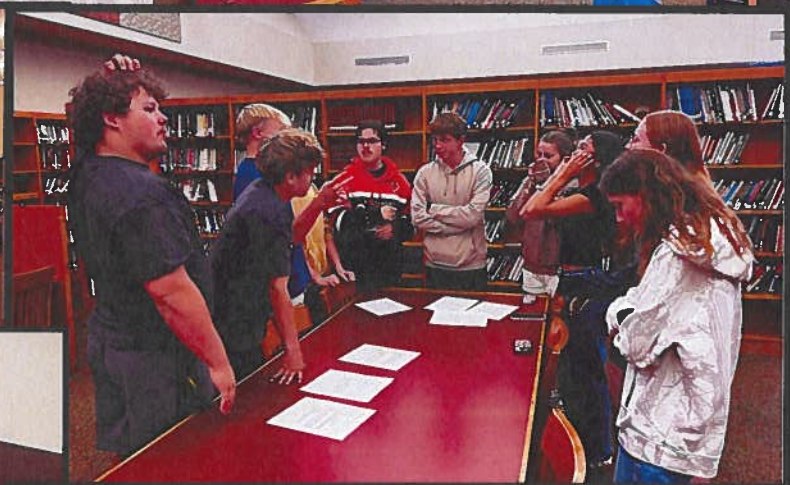
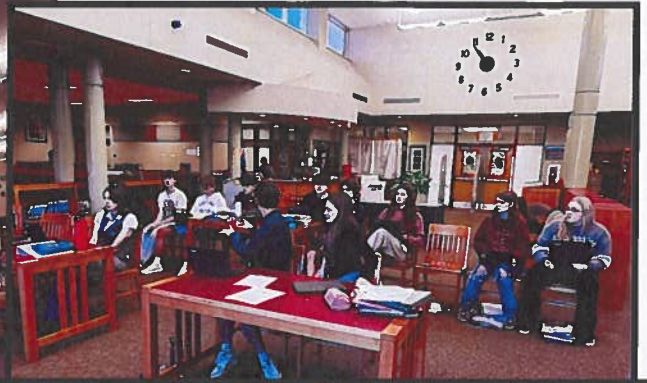
Bake for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the cookies are cooked through and bounce back slightly if you touch them.

Transfer cookies to a wire rack to cool until they reach room temperature. Then frost or drizzle with cream cheese frosting, and sprinkle with an extra pinch of pumpkin pie spice or cinnamon if you'd like. Refrigerate in a sealed container for up to 3 days.

To Make Cream Cheese Frosting: with an electric mixer, beat cream cheese, butter and vanilla together on medium-high speed until smooth. Gradually add in the powdered sugar until it is all combined and the frosting is smooth. If it is too thick, add in a tablespoon or two of milk (or water) until it reaches your desired consistency. If it is too thin, add in more powdered sugar until it reaches your desired consistency.

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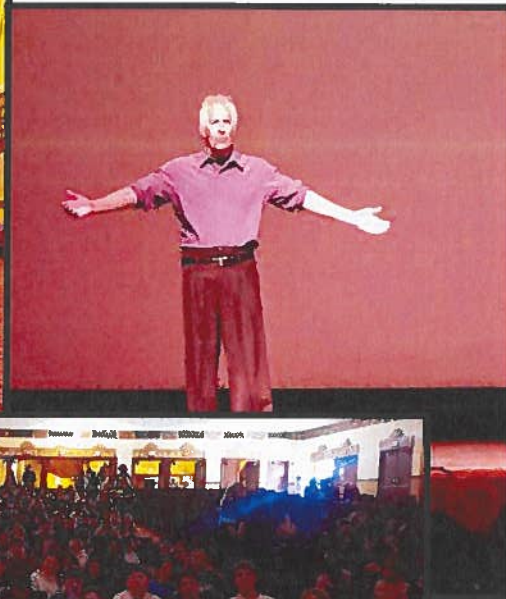
Tips and Trips for Junior High

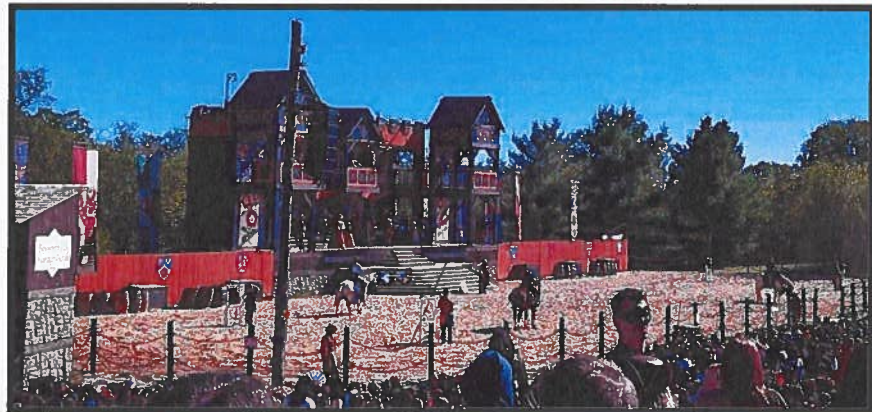

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


