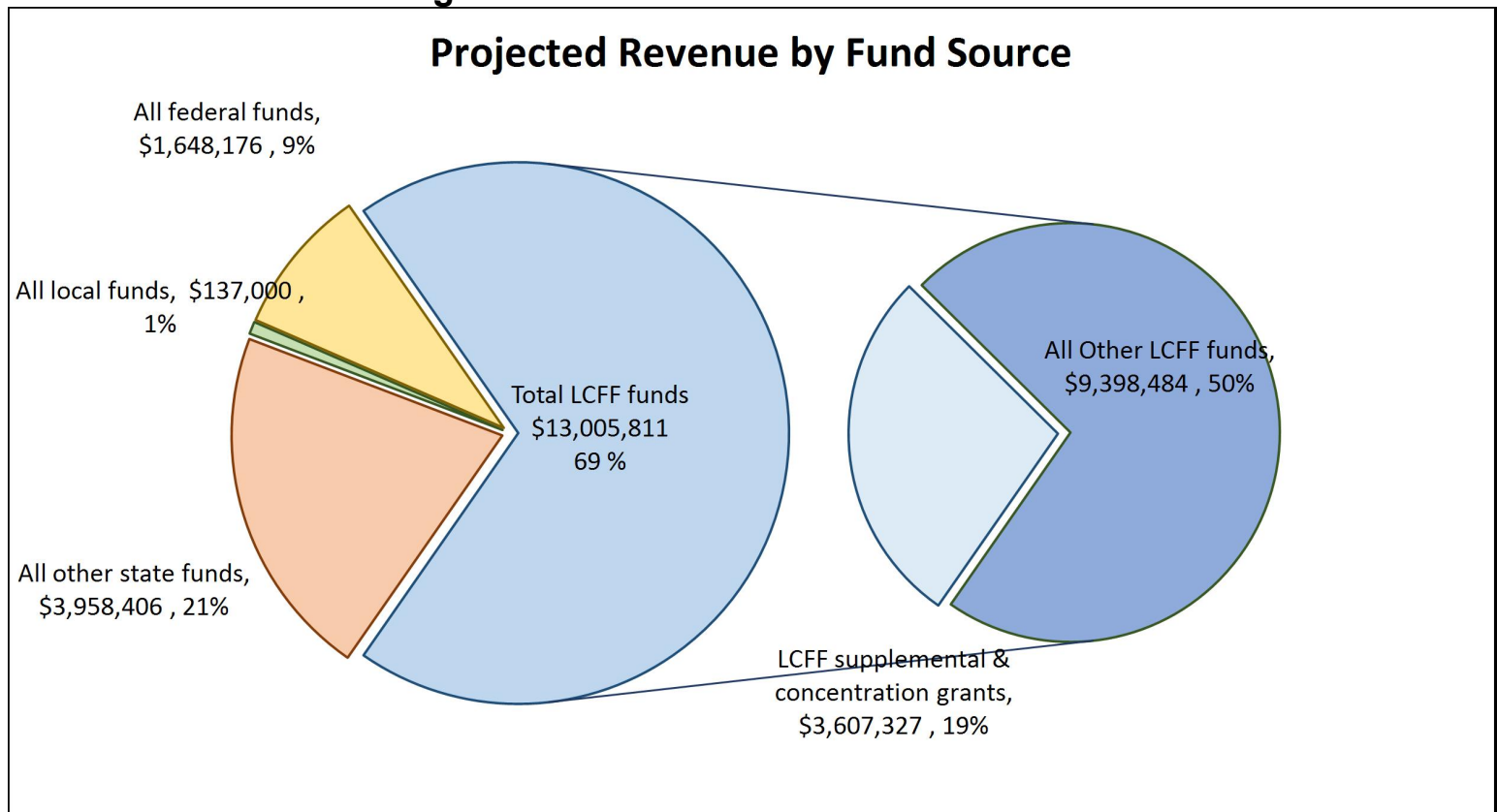

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

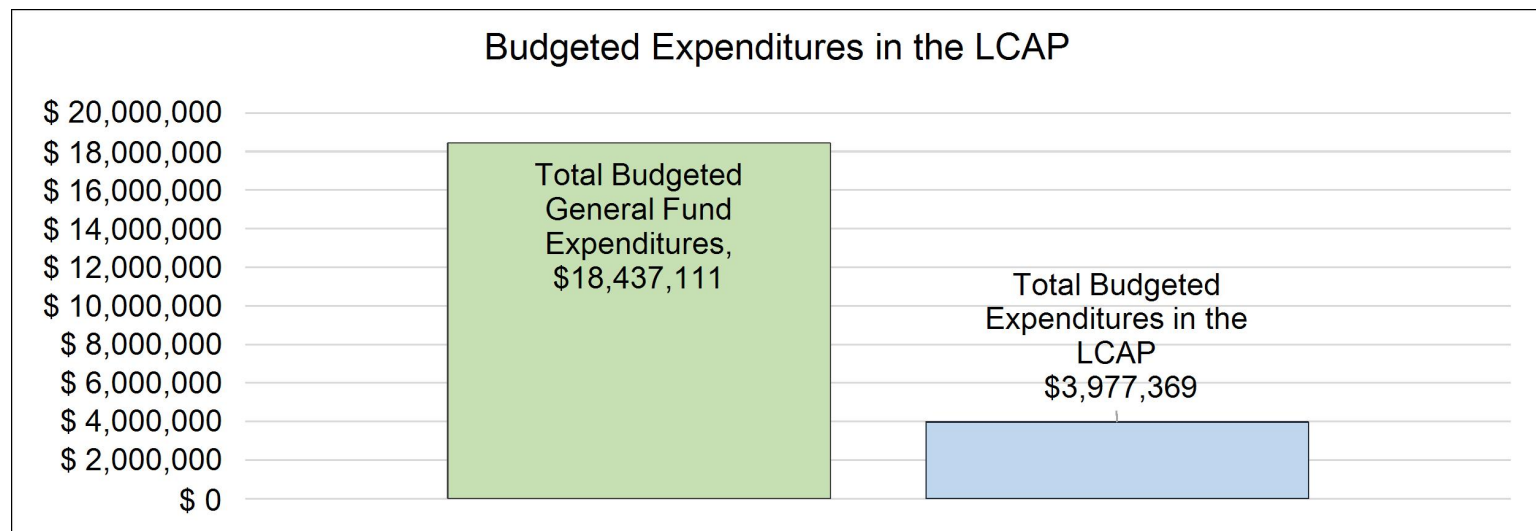


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue New Designs Charter School University Park expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for New Designs Charter School University Park is \$18,749,393, of which \$13,005,811 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$3,958,406 is other state funds, \$137,000 is local funds, and \$1,648,176 is federal funds. Of the \$13,005,811 in LCFF Funds, \$3,607,327 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

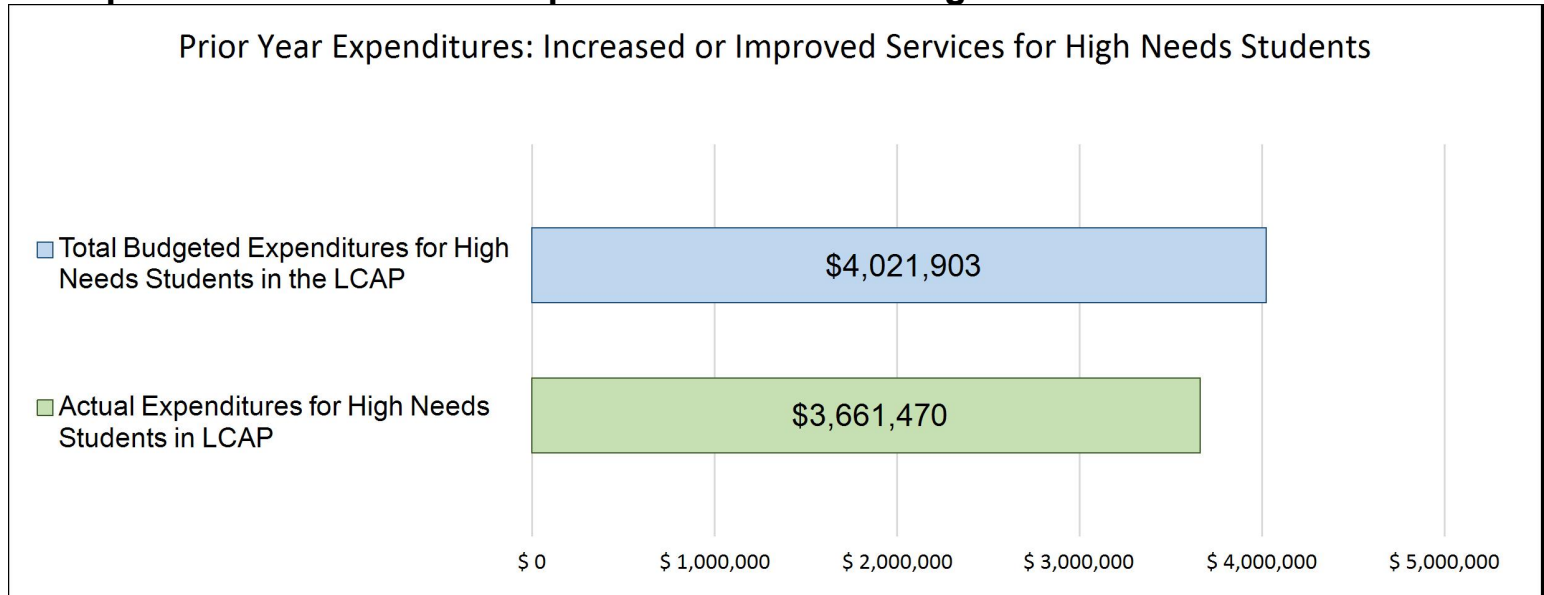
Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

In 2026-27, New Designs Charter School University Park is projecting it will receive \$360,732 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. New Designs Charter School University Park must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the LCAP. New Designs Charter School University Park plans to spend \$250,100 towards meeting this requirement, as described in the LCAP.

In the 2026-27 LCAP, the additional actions would include provision of additional resources such as after-school tutoring. Access to additional educational software on-line to assist students complete their assigned homework. Provision of additional psychological services to students if the need arises.

This chart compares what New Designs Charter School University Park budgeted last year in the LCAP for actions and services that contribute to increasing or improving services for high needs students with what New Designs Charter School University Park estimates it has spent on actions and services that contribute to increasing or improving services for high needs students in the current year.

The text description of the above chart is as follows: In 2025-26, New Designs Charter School University Park's LCAP budgeted \$4021903 for planned actions to increase or improve services for high needs students. New Designs Charter School University Park actually spent \$3661470 for actions to increase or improve services for high needs students in 2025-26.

The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$360,433 had the following impact on New Designs Charter School University Park's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

The initial budget for the FY2025-26 anticipated higher enrollment and therefore higher expenses. The school reduced expenses to match the actual enrollment while still spending more on high needs students than the total amount received in Supplemental and Concentration dollars.

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

New Designs Charter School, (NDCS) located just south of downtown Los Angeles, was founded in 2003 with the goal of developing an exemplary school offering high-quality, college-preparatory education to prepare students to succeed in a global, diverse, and technology-rich society. Currently the school serves 784 students in grades 6-12 and employs approximately 68 staff members. The school prepares its students for post-secondary academic and career opportunities and success by providing excellent professional development for teachers, encouraging the use of evidence-based teaching strategies in the classrooms, and providing a rigorous curriculum that has enrichment and intervention programs for all students.

The latest reported enrollment demographics available in Dataquest (24-25) are as follows:

Race/Ethnicity: 79.6% Hispanic, 8.5% African American, 1.9% white

Student Groups: 16.5% English Learners, 85.8% Socio-Economically Disadvantaged, 11.5% Students with Disabilities

Both middle and high school students are exposed to a wide-ranging curriculum. In high school, students choose among three career pathways in the areas of law and diplomacy, information technology, finance, medical sciences and engineering. Students also gain from partnerships the school has with local organizations including local community and technical trades colleges. The school is developing a data driven culture that seeks to respond and address felt needs in the school community in all areas covering academic, social-emotional, cultural and safety concerns.

LEARNING RECOVERY EMERGENCY BLOCK GRANT (LREBG)

The school used the additional round of LREBG funding in the 2025-26 school year to provide additional tutoring (Action 2.2) in support of Students with Disabilities (SWD) and English Learners (ELs). These are the student groups identified as experience the greatest academic need in ELA and Math.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

As demonstrated below, the 2025 Dashboard showed improvements in Math, the College and Career Indicator, Graduation rates and teacher credentialing/assignments. Scores maintained or declined overall in ELA and English Learner Progress. Chronic Absenteeism in the middle school continued to rise.

English/Language Arts (ELA): Overall, there was modest improvement in ELA, though students continued to score below standard in ELA. However, African American students and students with disabilities made great strides forward this year, with African American students improving by 30.2 points, landing only 2.2 points below standard, and students with disabilities improving by 36.3 points, almost eliminating their prior achievement gap. Long Term English Learners (LTELs) struggled the most, and declined a further 4.6 points. English Learners improved by 8.2 points, but the achievement gap remained large for them. Specific ongoing actions to address these needs include Goal 1, Action 4: Professional Development, and Goal 2, Actions 2-7, which include a number of intervention activities and supports.

Math: Overall, there was also modest improvement in math, through all student groups continued to score well below standard in Math. Again, African American students and students with disabilities made the most gains among all students groups, with African American students improving by 37.2 points, and students with disabilities improving by 46.8 points. English Learners also improved enough to move out of the red designation. All other students groups remained about where they were the previous year. Specific ongoing actions to address these needs include Goal 1, Action 4: Professional Development, and Goal 2, Actions 2-7, which include a number of intervention activities and supports.

Science: Science Points are new to the Dashboard this year and are still for informational purposes only. CAST scores improved for all student groups, though students with disabilities made the largest gains, increasing from 5.26% meeting or exceeding standards to 25.81%. English Learners also showed improvement, though they continued to perform far lower than all other student groups.

Efforts to continue to support science achievement for all students is addressed in Goal 1, Action 4: Professional Development, as well as Goal 2, Action 4.

English Learner Progress Indicator (ELPI): The ELPI declined 3% from the prior year. Ongoing efforts to support English Learners are addressed in Goal 1, Action 4: Professional Development, as well as Goal 2, Actions 5 and 6: ELD Instruction and EL and LTEL Support.

College and Career Indicator (CCI): All student groups improved on the CCI indicator. Efforts to support college and career readiness are addressed in Goal 2, Actions 9, (A-G Completion) 10, (CTE Pathways) 11, (Dual Enrollment) and 12 (Course, College and Career Guidance).

Absenteeism: High levels of absenteeism continue to persist since the pandemic, negatively impacting student achievement. All student groups were in the red category except African American students, who were in the orange category. Attempts to improve attendance and parental involvement in the school are addressed in Goal 3, Actions 1 & 2 (Family Engagement), Actions 3 & 4, (Social-Emotional Learning and Well-Being Promotion) Actions 5 & 6, (Mental Health Services) and Action 8 (Attendance Improvement).

Suspension: Efforts to keep suspension rates at 0% and improve school culture are addressed in Goal 3, Actions 3 & 4.

Clear Teachers: Though the percentage of Clear teachers increased from the prior year, the ongoing teacher shortage has made it difficult to recruit properly credentialed teachers. At the most recent reporting of teacher assignment data in 2023-24, New Designs was below the statewide average of 82.5% Clear Teachers. The school continues to focus its efforts to recruit and train high quality teachers, as described in Goal 1, Action 1.

The school qualified for Differentiated Assistance in 2025 based on the California Dashboard categories of Pupil Achievement and Pupil Engagement.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Discussions with parents revealed that their greatest concerns or interests lay within three areas covered in the current LCAP. These areas were student academic performance, school safety and school culture, and support given to English learners and other struggling student

groups. Parents overwhelmingly supported providing teachers with more professional development that would equip teachers with appropriate tools to reach all students at their current level of learning. Goal 1 Action 4 addresses this concern. They also supported the idea of increasing and improving after school tutoring through hiring more qualified staff to focus on academic activities and providing homework help. Goal 2 Action 3 addresses this need.

Parents were also warm to the ideas and actions focused on improving school culture and ensuring campus safety through hiring of more campus aides and providing more sports and extra-curricular activities that build cohesion and a sense of pride and belonging. Goal 3 Action 4 is meeting this need. Parents also wanted more opportunities to volunteer in the school.

Teachers focused on the need for relevant professional development targeted at grade level curriculum and evidence-based instructional strategies to reach all students. Goal 1 Action 4 & Goal 2 Action 7 are addressing this need. Teachers wanted to see more resources devoted to interventions in core classes in order to improve student performance in state assessments. Teachers wanted strong supports for English Learners and Students with Disabilities so that they can master the fundamentals of mathematics and the English language. Goal 2 Actions 5 & 6 are addressing this need. Teachers felt the after school program needed more support and programs that balance academic and non-academic activities.

Students indicated they needed more variety in sporting and extra-curricular activities. Goal 3 Action 4 seek to fulfill this need.

The feedback received indicated that LCAP actions are effective and achieving intended goals.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

1.1 Classroom Teacher Recruitment: Fully implemented. Recruitment this year was better than last year, and all positions were filled. The Drama teacher left partway through the year, and a long term substitute teacher taught the class.

1.2 Curriculum: Fully implemented. The school began using MyPerspective, by Savvas for ELA and Envision Math by Savvas this year. All other curriculum worked well and was utilized as planned.

1.3 School Maintenance and Custodial: Fully implemented. The school retrofitted the earthquake resistance systems for the buildings.

1.4 Professional Development-Academic Instruction: Fully implemented. Curriculum training was provided on Envision Math, Springboard, Freckle, and MyPerspective. The EL Coordinator provided training at staff meetings on helping English Learners access the standards. Equity Paramount provided training on determining academic readiness, differentiated instruction, and culturally responsive instruction. In-house training was also provided by the curriculum specialists.

1.5 Broad Course of Study - Middle School: Fully Implemented: All students participated in ACE, the enrichment program. All students had advisory and technology classes.

1.6 Broad Course of Study - High School: Fully Implemented: This year the school added AP Literature, and continued offering AP Language and AP US History. Increasing numbers of students participated in dual enrollment opportunities with Los Angeles Trade Tech.

There were no material differences between budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for Goal 1.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

1.1 Classroom Teacher Recruitment: This was effective. There were more teachers available and the school started recruitment earlier this year.

1.2 Curriculum: The new curriculum was effective. Teachers reported that the Savvas was more student-friendly and MyPerspective had a lot of online tools to support with interventions.

1.3 School Maintenance and Custodial: This was effective. The school remained safe and clean.

1.4 Professional Development-Academic Instruction: The PD was effective in addressing many instructional strategies. The teachers maintained a strong collegiality again this year. Walk-throughs of the classrooms were effective in encouraging teachers to continue to implement the new strategies with fidelity.

1.5 Broad Course of Study - Middle School: The students were especially engaged in the technology classes, and the ACE class allowed them to catch up with their core coursework.

1.6 Broad Course of Study - High School: It was effective. The additional AP class opened up more opportunities for students to participate. It's a good way to retain some of our best students.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

This goal was developed in response to the needs identified through data analysis of the 2023 Dashboard and other assessments. The analysis of the 2023 Dashboard indicated that while students made modest gains, they still scored below standard in ELA and Math. 2023 CAST data showed an overall decline in science achievement and demonstrated a need for a stronger focus on science instruction. The analysis of test scores by student groups identified a need to specifically support the achievement of English Learners and students with disabilities.

While the CCI was met and 55% of the students were prepared for College and Career, this goal prioritizes actions for the high school that will increase this percentage.

The school plans to improve performance in ELA, Math, and Science for all students, and in College and Career Readiness for high schoolers, through the actions described below that support student learning, and will measure progress toward this goal using the metrics identified below.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

2.1 Tier I Interventions: Fully Implemented. There was good collaboration between the ELD Coordinator and teachers to support instruction for English Learners. In addition, all lesson plans were checked for sufficient differentiation.

2.2 Tier II Interventions: Fully implemented. Tutoring in Math and English was provided to students during the school day through the ACE program for all middle school students. An additional TA worked with 6th and 7th grade students in math and English.

2.3 Tier III Interventions: Implemented. After school tutoring was provided for the middle school students who needed stronger supports. Saturday school was available for any students who needed additional support.

2.4 Science Enrichment: Teachers attended a science training this year and have been implementing more project-based learning in science. CAST Bootcamp was held prior to the testing window.

2.5 ELD Instruction: Fully implemented. ELD supports were integrated into all general ed courses. English Learners attended a designated ELD class period with the EL teacher in which they received support in English as well as support preparing for the ELPAC.

2.6 EL and LTEL Support: Parents of English Learners were invited to Coffees with the Principal, ELAC, PAC, and SSC meetings. The school has a bilingual assistant who offers translation assistance.

2.7 Professional Development-Special Education: Fully implemented. Whenever Professional Development was provided, a portion was devoted to special education, specifically to understanding accommodations, IEP goals, UDL, and to helping teachers better understand the different modes of instruction. The Resource Specialist Providers also provided support to teachers individually and in small groups according to their needs.

2.9 A-G Completion: Fully implemented. The school offered AP classes, A-G-structured classes, credit-recovery classes after school, and college credit classes with local colleges during and after school. Colleges allowed the students to retake the classes if needed. Some students used APEX for credit recovery.

2.9 CTE Pathways: Fully implemented. All 5 pathways were available. Students begin a pathway in 9th grade and complete it in 3 years.

2.10 Dual Enrollment: Fully implemented. The school offered dual enrollment college courses. All students take at least one college course prior to graduation regardless of their pathway, and many take two or three.

2.11 Course, College, and Career Guidance: Fully implemented. In addition to providing school students with course planning, college and career guidance, assistance with the college application process, and strategies for college test-taking, such as advanced placement and admissions tests, the counselors also support with financial aid applications as well as facilitating apprenticeships and post-secondary job entry.

The school spent 16.2% less than budgeted. This was primarily due to spending less on intervention staffing to meet a lower actual budget than was anticipated.

2.1 - 2.3 Tier I, II, III Interventions: Based on academic assessments, these interventions have been helpful. The students like the additional help and the TA in the classroom to give them the small group and 1:1 support.

2.4 Science Enrichment: This has been effective. From classroom observations, students were very engaged in their project-based science activities, and demonstrated more interest in science.

2.5 ELD Instruction: This has been effective as evidenced from improving ELA and Math scores for English Learners.

2.6 EL and LTEL Support: Parent support and involvement increased. The number of parents coming to meetings increased, especially when combining them with Coffee with the Principal.

2.7 Professional Development-Special Education: Teachers responded positively to the Special Education topics and were engaged in professional discussions. Teachers gave positive feedback on the PD.

2.8 A-G Completion: These efforts were effective and 96% of all students completed their A-G requirements.

2.9 CTE Pathways: Medical Science was the preferred pathway and most popular with students. Engineering and Law and Diplomacy were also popular.

2.10 Dual Enrollment: The percentage of students completing these courses has been steadily increasing.

2.11 Course, College, and Career Guidance: This action was working well. Students received help with applications and organizing college trips to see college life. This was motivating for them. Getting help with the college admission, the application process, as well as post-secondary job placement was very helpful for students.

This goal was developed to address the need to strengthen family participation and decrease student absenteeism. The 2023 Dashboard reported a chronic absenteeism rate of 25%, while parent participation in advisory groups, surveys, or other means of input-gathering remains very low. This goal was also developed to increase staff morale, as staff feedback indicated that they would appreciate more social-emotional support.

The actions described below will focus on professional development for school staff in the areas of increasing parental involvement and SEL for students in order to increase engagement, overall. They also focus on providing more social-emotional support for the teachers and staff. The school will measure progress toward this goal using the metrics identified below.

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

3.1 Professional Development-Family Engagement: The school implemented a series of professional development sessions focused on strengthening family engagement practices among staff. These sessions emphasized the importance of building authentic partnerships with families, improving communication strategies, and ensuring that parents are meaningfully involved in their children's academic progress. Teachers and staff were trained on effective methods of outreach, including structured communication, culturally responsive engagement, and strategies for involving families in academic decision-making. As a result, the school observed increased participation in parent meetings, improved responsiveness to school communications, and a stronger sense of collaboration between home and school. However, challenges remain. A segment of families continues to face barriers related to work schedules, language differences, and limited access to technology, which can affect consistent participation. The school continues to refine its approach by expanding flexible meeting times, increasing translation services, and exploring multiple communication platforms to ensure equitable access.

3.2 Protocols for Engagement: The school established and implemented clear protocols for engagement to standardize communication and interaction between staff, students, and families. These protocols include expectations for timely communication, structured parent conferences, consistent follow-up procedures, and clearly defined channels for addressing concerns. The implementation of these protocols has resulted in greater consistency and professionalism in staff-family interactions, as well as improved clarity in communication across the school community. Teachers are more deliberate in documenting interactions and following up with families, contributing to a more organized and transparent system. Despite these gains, some inconsistencies in implementation were observed, particularly among newer staff members. Continued monitoring and reinforcement of expectations are needed to ensure that all staff adhere consistently to the established protocols. Additional training and administrative support will be provided to strengthen the fidelity of implementation.

3.3 Professional Development-Social-Emotional Learning: The school provided targeted professional development focused on social-emotional learning (SEL) to support both student development and classroom climate. Training sessions addressed key competencies such as self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. Teachers were equipped with practical strategies to integrate SEL into daily instruction, including the use of check-ins, restorative practices, and opportunities for student reflection. As a result, classrooms have shown improved student engagement, stronger relationships, and a more positive learning environment. Challenges in this area include the need for deeper integration of SEL into academic instruction and ensuring that all staff are equally confident in implementing SEL practices. Additionally, time constraints within the instructional day can limit opportunities for sustained SEL activities. The school will continue to provide ongoing support and coaching to strengthen implementation.

3.4 Well-Being Promotion: The school has made a concerted effort to promote the overall well-being of students and staff, recognizing its critical role in academic success and school climate. Initiatives have included wellness activities, mental health awareness, access to counseling services, and efforts to create a safe and supportive school environment. Students have benefited from increased access to support services, and staff have been encouraged to prioritize both student and personal well-being. These efforts have contributed to a more positive school culture and improved student behavior and engagement. Nevertheless, challenges persist. The demand for mental health services continues to exceed available resources, and some students require more intensive support than the school can currently provide. Additionally, balancing academic expectations with well-being initiatives remains an ongoing consideration. The school will continue to explore partnerships, expand support services, and refine its approach to ensure that well-being remains a central component of the educational experience.

3.1 Professional Development-Family Engagement: Parent Engagement has been both effective and ineffective in parts. Parent participation and engagement has been very effective, as evidenced in award/honors celebrations which have been standing room only of late. Attendance to parent conferences has been steady and productive with parents filling all/most appointment slots available. Parents that participate in parent meetings consistently share positive feedback and report feeling heard and welcomed. The area that is still lacking is

the rate of increased parent participation. Although the participants are mainly consistent every month, NDC would love to growth the % rate at faster rate.

3.2 Protocols for Engagement: Protocols for engagement are effective in that parents are comfortable communicating with school staff and personnel. Parents are at liberty to communicate and meet with teachers and admin regarding any questions or concerns. Admin has been available to join in conversations or facilitate any concerns if a need or situation should necessitate the assistance.

3.3 Professional Development-Social-Emotional Learning: Education and training has been effective in enabling teachers and staff to engage with greater knowledge and awareness as to additional factors for student behavior, absences, or low achievement. It provided teachers and staff greater platforms to engage and discuss sensitive topics with students and learn how to better support them. The ineffectiveness remains in the limitations that the trainings can provide. There are many emotional and health issues that must be navigated with sensitivity. SEL also requires much vulnerability and sensitivity from educators, which is often found in maturing and growing through experience.

3.4 Well-Being Promotion: The protocols have been effective in general. Students know they can request assistance from counselors or may often seek out teachers or staff members they feel comfortable with. It is a part of culture to seek out a staff member when a student feels distressed. Meetings are opened with 'mood checks' to gage member's health status. Parents in meetings also seek out support and guidance on varying issues regarding their children's academic, social, and 'stages of growth'.

3.5 School-Based Mental Health Services: On-site services are beneficial because students get service and counseling within their day and can access and implement strategies as they arise. The previous years- this was lacking as the outside services were handled by the referral group Care Solice.

3.6 Outside Mental Health Services: Students and families that received services were very happy. The struggle was that as a referring service, they often couldn't make a tangible solid connection due to uncompleted paperwork or inconsistent communication with the service provider chosen.

3.7 Attendance Improvement: The attendance in the high school has remained steady. The major challenge for ND has been regaining attendance post covid- reteaching academic value in attendance, overcoming bus and metro issues, and addressing the culture/custom of having sibling caretake minor children during a portion of the school day. Incentives such as free dress day is proving to be effective especially in the Middle School, as more students strive for that weekly reward.

- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
