

# The Zone 6b Onion Hall of Fame

## *...and Where to Get These Celebrity Bulbs-in-the-Making*

Not all onions are created equal. Some grow huge, some store forever, some are sweet enough to eat like apples (no judgment), and some will make you cry—but only because they taste so good. Here are the top varieties that thrive in our high-country Zone 6b gardens.

Most long-day onions are suited for Zone 6b — the ones that bulb under long summer daylight — are **ONLY available as seeds** or occasionally as purchased *plants* (seedlings). Sets are typically short-day or generic mixed types and **not ideal for large, high-quality bulbs** in our climate.

These are the superstar onions and shallots that ROCK our high-country gardens. Long-day, cold-tolerant, flavorful, beautiful, and proven by gardeners like us. Let the bulb-worship begin.

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## 1. PATTERSON (Storage All-Star) - seed only



**Start from seed:** *November–January* for biggest bulbs.

**Notes:** Rarely, if ever, sold as sets. Designed to be grown from seed for long storage.

**Why it's legendary:**

- The *gold standard* for storage onions (8–10+ months!)
- Perfectly round, firm, golden bulbs
- Disease-resistant and reliable in fluctuating spring temps

**Best for:** Winter pantry storage, large harvests, and gardeners who love consistency.

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## **2. AILSA CRAIG (The Sweet Giant) - seed only**



**Start from seed:** *November–January* (especially if you want the giant size).

**Notes:** Never sold as sets. Must be grown from seed due to heirloom type and growth habit.

**Why gardeners love it:**

- Enormous, softball-sized onions
- Mild, sweet flavor—dreamy for salads and caramelizing
- A showstopper on any harvest table

**Best for:** Fresh summer eating (not long-term storage).

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## **3. RED WING (The Best Storage Red) - seed only**





**Start from seed:** *December–January.*

**Notes:** Long-day reds are almost never available as sets; they don't perform well that way.  
**Seed only.**

**Why it's amazing:**

- Beautiful deep-red skins
- Surprisingly long storage (rare for reds!)
- Crisp texture and vibrant color in salads & salsas

**Best for:** Gardeners who cook with a *lot* of red onion.

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#### **4. YELLOW SWEET SPANISH (Classic Kitchen Workhorse) - seeds or sets**



**SEED start:** *January* for large bulbs.

**SETS:** Sometimes available in stores, but...

**Note:** Sets will produce smaller, stronger-flavored bulbs than starting from seed. If you want *sweet*, go with seed.

**Why it's a winner:**

- Sweet, golden, large bulbs
- Reliable even in tough soils
- Excellent for everyday cooking

**Best for:** Soups, stews, roasting, caramelizing—THE versatile onion.

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## 5. CANDY ONION (Intermediate-Day Sweetie from Gurney's) - seeds or plants (not sets)



**SEED start:** *December–January*.

**PLANTS:** Sold as bare-root bundles (very popular and reliable).

**NOT** typically sold as sets — intermediate-day varieties don't perform well when dried into sets.

### Why it earned a place in the Hall of Fame:

- Sweet, mild flavor—but with more body than Vidalias
- Bulbs size up reliably even in higher elevation areas
- Quicker to mature (85–100 days)
- Loved by local growers for consistent results

**Best for:** Gardeners wanting big, sweet onions without super early seed-starting demands.

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## 6. ZEBRUNE SHALLOT (Banana Shallot Elegance) - seed only



**Start from seed:** *November–January* for largest clusters.

**Notes:** Unlike classic shallots, Zebune is a *seed-grown shallot* and must be started early for best results.

### Why it's fancy:

- Mild, gourmet flavor
- Produces generous clusters
- Excellent for roasting, sauces, and French cooking
- Stores beautifully

**Best for:** Anyone wanting to grow something special beyond standard onions.

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## 7. BONUS PICK: RED ZEPPELIN - seeds or plants (rarely sets)



**SEED start:** *January.*

**PLANTS:** Often available as bare-root transplants.

**SETS:** Very uncommon—most red onion sets are generic short-day types unsuitable for Zone 6b.

**Why it soars:**

- Big, rosy-red bulbs
- Juicy flavor and great crunch
- Better storage than many red varieties

**Best for:** Gardeners wanting both beauty *and* storage power.

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## Why most long-day onions **MUST** be grown from seed in Zone 6b

- Sets are grown by forcing onions to bulb prematurely, then drying them.
- This process works well for short-day onions (southern varieties).
- Long-day onions (what we grow) **bolt easily** when grown as sets.
- Seed-grown plants are stronger, more uniform, and produce larger bulbs.

**So for biggest, best-quality onions → choose seed.**

If you want convenience → choose purchased *plants* (not sets).
