Social Work is a professional field that aims to help individuals, groups, and communities alleviate social welfare issues such as mental health issues, poverty, homelessness, drug/alcohol addiction, family and community violence, and psychological and social aspects of physical illness. With an associate degree individuals can enter the field of social services as an entry level paraprofessional. To become a professional social worker, students must continue their education and complete a bachelor's degree in Social Work. TOCC prepares students to transfer to a university to complete their professional education.

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- c. Abilities: Students will develop the ability to recognize and challenge cultural biases and stereotypes, engage in self-reflection and ongoing learning to enhance cultural humility, and advocate for culturally responsive policies and practices within social service systems.
- 3. Demonstrate Professional Values, Ethics, and Decision-Making
 - a. Knowledge: Students will comprehend the ethical principles, values, and codes of conduct that guide professional social work practice as dictated by the National Association of Social Workers.
 - b. Skills: Students will demonstrate ethical decision-making skills in complex and challenging situations, applying ethical frameworks and critical thinking to navigate dilemmas and conflicts within professional practice.

Abilities: Students will integrate ethical principles into their practice, maintaining professional boundaries, confidentiality, and integrity while upholding the rights and dignity of clients, colleagues, and communities. They will also advocate for ethical and socially just policies and practices at individual, organizational, and systemic levels.
